

A Year's Overview by Father Robert Aluinzi

STATE OF THE PARISH ADDRESS

Dear Parishioners,

It is a little over a year since I became your pastor and since then, despite the obvious challenges of transition, I have had a great and very exciting time with you. During this period, three things have consistently stood out for me as your shepherd, and that is:

One, I love you. Two, I love you. And Three, I love you so, so much.

I feel so blessed to be your pastor at this point of my priesthood. During the past 33 years of my life as a priest, I was fortunate to have had experiences of serving both in school administration, as a high school principal and in parish pastoral life as pastor of two other parishes in our diocese before being assigned here. In my current assignment among you, I hope to be able to combine these experiences to serve both our parish and school communities as best as I can. I am particularly grateful to God for the gift of our children in our school and parish. I love our children; I love our great school.

So, with these experiences, I come among you, not with the mindset of "achieving" or making an "impression," but to love you and to serve you with kindness, dedication and joy. I intend to continue doing this through building relationships among yourselves and above all, with God. My ultimate goal in doing this is to lead you all to heaven. We will do this through our focus on the Eucharist and devotion to our Mother Mary after whom our parish is named. Therefore, adoration will be a significant feature of our parish especially as we are soon completing the construction of our perpetual adoration chapel. This is why I am so passionate about this construction project of the chapel. We will also give great prominence to the feasts of our Blessed Mother and especially to our parish feast day, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, which usually falls on July 16th every year.

Lastly, I will also be emphasizing making stewardship a way of life here in our parish. I will be repeatedly inviting you to consider all the things that you have: your time, talent and treasure (money) as a gift from God. I will ask you to share these generously with your parish.

Reflecting on this past year, there is no doubt in my mind that God has been at work in our parish in amazing ways through the different sacraments, ministries, projects and events that we celebrated. In our parish, we are blessed to have 26 active ministries. Some of these are already expounded in detail in this document by the ministry and department heads. Other ministries are still less known, but we will work on that.

LIFE TEEN/EDGE:

Our Life Teen program was run by our very dynamic and multi-talented coordinator Miguel Nunez and his very dedicated core-team members. We currently have 30 high school and 40 middle school teens attending faith formation activities weekly. During this past year, Miguel and our core team also planned a series of retreats and conferences for them. Details of these are in his report.

ADULT FAITH AND SPIRITUAL FORMATION:

In order to keep our adult community continually engaged in their faith and spiritual growth, and in keeping with the spirit of our parish, we have been able to host a series of talks on the Eucharist and on Mother Mary throughout the year and during the Lenten and Advent Seasons. Kathy Egle oversees this department. More talks and activities are planned for the months to come especially on the Eucharist. See the article written by Kathy for details.

MUSIC:

Our choir members under the directorship of Dan Ballinger, assisted by Nick, Nicki, Jordan, and fourteen other musicians, continue to provide us with excellent music. They all did a fantastic job this past year. Currently there are 25 in the adult choir, 46 in the children's school choir and 19 musicians.

LITURGY:

Liturgy is the bedrock of our faith and worship. The celebration of the Holy Eucharist remains the source and summit of our faith. That is why we have tried our best to provide the best possible liturgical experience for you through lively music and inspiring homilies. We are blessed to have very dedicated liturgical ministers and volunteers. To ensure a well-organized liturgy, we recently hired a Liturgy Coordinator, Joseph Malzone. Joseph not only has vast experience but also knowledge of liturgy. We have 205 liturgical ministers and volunteers serving with him who keep our liturgy lively and inspiring. We have recently updated the sound equipment to provide us with a clear sound experience.

STAFF, COUNCILS & MINISTRIES:

Our parish is perhaps one of the most active ones in the Diocese of Phoenix served by highly talented staff, councils and ministries. I am advised by the Pastoral, Finance and School Advisory Board Councils. Please refer to the Council page (pg. 20) of the report for a complete list of council members. Additionally, we have over 20 active ministries in total that serve our community. You may read descriptions of each ministry on the Ministry page (pg. 11-12) and I will offer details on each one of these separately in future articles.

SCHOOL:

We are so blessed to have a very vibrant Catholic School led by equally a very competent principal, Dr. Kelly Shewbridge and Tony Groseta her assistant principal. Our school, one of the largest elementary schools in the Diocese of Phoenix boasts a student population of 530 in preschool through 8th grade. Our students are respectful and faithful led by dedicated teachers and staff. Being the largest ministry of our parish, we take great care to ensure that our students get the best education. In the meantime, please pray that God will continue to open our eyes, our minds, and our hearts to recognize even more clearly, how much we really need to remain close to Jesus, who truly desires that we come and spend time with him. LIFE TEEN & EDGE



Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Youth Ministry engages over 200+ middle school and high school teens each year.

Life Teen International recently shared a 2024 report -The State of Catholic Youth in America. "Today's teens navigate a barrage of pressures that were intensified by the pandemic—social media's dominance in their lives, depression, gender dysphoria, and political division. These pressures lead to disillusionment and a profound lack of genuine connection. This complex landscape offers a pivotal opportunity for Catholic ministry." Our team has seen that these pressures are real in our parish. We strive to offer life-changing experiences with Jesus in hopes of being holy men and women. "Young people today are more open to spiritual exploration and spiritual experiences than previous generations. This presents an opportunity to shepherd this desire for faith into a deeper understanding of Christ and His Church." (State of Catholic Youth in America)

Life Teen International has highlighted five critical areas impacting Catholic teen discipleship: working through anxiety, finding belonging and seeking community, purposeful connection, the need for family and navigating loneliness.

Our core team walks with our teens in their faith, ensuring all teens know they can have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and respond to the call to live a life of intentional discipleship. We do this by offering weekly nights of Catechesis, three high school retreats, five middle school retreats, three core formation retreats, guest speakers like priests, seminarians, religious sisters, and organizations like Aid to Women Center.

"The importance of engaging young people in our faith cannot be overstated. Previous generations returned to their faith in adulthood, this does not hold true with today's generation of youth. Instead, the youth need to be actively engaged during their pivotal teen years. Our outreach must be urgent, thoughtful and pastoral. We must meet them where they seek connection and belonging. As ministers, it is our responsibility to help them encounter Christ and nurture their faith through discipleship. We are the "first responders" in faith, guiding, supporting, and inspiring them on their journey within the Catholic community." (The State of Catholic Youth in America, 1)







<u>Our Lady's Men of Christ-</u>Provides opportunities for Christian fellowship with Catholic men while focusing on education, prayer and evangelization.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel lay Dominican Saint Pope Pius V Chapter- Bringing souls to Jesus through the teachings of Dominican Saints and others. Being pro-life from conception to natural death while at all times being authentically Catholic.

<u>Ministry of Ushers and Hospitality</u>- The ushers are servants for the Mass - we provide ease, comfort and security to the Parish. We greet the parishioners, help with seating or communion needs, secure the offering and provide oversight for the Mass in case anything is needed

<u>Prayer Teams</u>- The first Sunday of every month, prayer teams are available after the 9am and 11am Masses to pray over people for their needs.

<u>Iron Maidens</u>- Every Sunday, an assigned volunteer picks up the purificators and the hand towels in the Sacristy. We wash, dry and iron the purificators and return them by Wednesday.

Ministers of Care Ministers of Care visit the hospitalized and the homebound in the name of Christ and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish. We serve the Catholic patients at Tempe St. Luke's Hospital and the homebound of our parish that request the Eucharist be brought to them.

Ministry of Annulments- Individuals in Catholic parishes who are divorced have the right to submit a petition for an annulment. The Diocese of Phoenix Tribunal initiates petitions at the parish level, with and through the assistance of trained Nullity Ministers.

Adoration Ministry- As Catholics we believe Jesus is truly present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the sacred Host, so spending time before Him is a wonderful aspect of our Eucharistic life. Adorers can spend time before the Lord in silent prayer, meditation, reading prayer books, reading the Bible, praying the rosary, or just sitting and enjoying the peace that comes from being in the Presence of God.

<u>Women's Studies Ministry</u>- The OLMC Women's Studies Ministry is dedicated to helping women grow in their relationship with God through fellowship, scripture teachings and group discussions.

St. Therese Group- St. Therese Group aims to work closely with parish leaders, school administration and teachers to identify opportunities to strengthen and promote our Catholic Identity throughout Our Lady of Mount Carmel School and Parish.

<u>Women's Sodality</u>- We foster a devotion to our Blessed Mother Mary. We care for the needs of the parish through our personal service, prayer groups and raising funds for various projects. We meet once a month.

<u>Divine Mercy Group</u>- To encourage awareness and understanding of the Divine Mercy Message. To coordinate the celebration of The Feast of Mercy on Divine Mercy Sunday.

<u>The Feast of Pentecost Ministry</u>- To prepare for Pentecost with the Holy Spirit Novena and coordinate the celebration for Pentecost Sunday.

Advent Tea- To prepare ladies for the coming of Jesus and honor our Blessed Mother.

PARISH MINISTRIES

St. Vincent de Paul- We are committed to serving people in our community who find themselves in a difficult situation. Visiting them in their homes, we assess their individual needs and provide emergency food boxes, help pay rent and utility bills, offer clothes and furniture vouchers, and refer them to other organizations.

Knights of Columbus- The Knights of Columbus are "practical Catholic" men over the age of 18 interested in serving Christ, the church and the community about two-four hours a month. The Knights of Columbus is the world's largest Catholic fraternal organization dedicated to providing charitable services, promoting Catholic education and actively defending Catholicism in various nations.

<u>Rosary Makers</u>- The Carmelitas of Our Lady of Mount Carmel gather once a month in prayer and community to produce rosaries for distribution during outreach, hospital visits, homebound visits and special events at Mount Carmel.

<u>Shaw Ministry</u>- Care and the love of knitting (and crocheting) have been combined into this prayerful ministry that reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace. Many blessings are knitted/crocheted into every item.

<u>Bereavement</u> -This ministry provides comfort to parishioners who have lost a loved one. The opportunity to share, read, and reflect, in a small group setting, helps those in attendance find encouragement for changes in their lives while working through their grief journey.



Mom's Rosary Group- If you would like to join a group of OLMC mothers in rosary, we would love to pray with you! We usually meet on a school-day morning. Any parent who would like to join is welcome and you are welcome to bring children.

<u>Living Rosary Group</u>- The Living Rosary Group honors Our Blessed Mother by praying the rosary, and we serve the church by praying for fallen away Catholics, parish convert work, spiritual and temporal welfare of priests, sisters, seminarians, deacons and brothers.

<u>Unitas</u>- Unitas is designed to aid engaged couples in gaining additional insights into their relationship and involve them in the parish community. This fulfills Dioceasan marriage preparation requirements.

<u>Lectors</u>- Lectors at Our Lady of Mount Carmel are well-spoken men and women comfortable speaking to large audiences and interested in proclaiming the word of God during Mass.

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion-

Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are individuals with a deep love for the Eucharist, willing to serve the body and blood of Christ during Mass.

<u>Celebrate Recovery</u>- Celebrate Recovery is a Christ Centered 12-step group where it is understood your higher power is Jesus Christ. Anyone struggling with hurts, habits and hang-ups is invited to join.

Respect Life Ministry
- This ministry assists by helping to make the parish a center of life, a place where parishioners understand the issues and the importance of meeting the needs of those who are most vulnerable - especially mothers and their unborn children and those who are seriously ill or dying and their families.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded in 1833 by a student named Antoine Frederic Ozanam in response to taunts from fellow students: What is Christianity doing to help the poor and suffering? The group recruited as their model and patron the great French saint and champion of the poor, St. Vincent de Paul. The first U.S. conference was in 1845, the Society was established in Arizona in 1946, and OLMC SVDP Conference was established in 1953.

The vocation of the Society's members who are called Vincentians serve in hope. No work of charity is foreign to the Society. It includes any form of help that alleviates suffering or deprivation and promotes human dignity and personal integrity in all their dimensions. SVDP gives priority to the poorest of the poor and to those who are most rejected by society. Our parishioners, benefactors, and our OLMC Falcons all help to make sure we live up to our mission statement: FEED, CLOTHE, HOUSE, HEAL.

PARISH MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT



The mission of the society of St. Vincent de Paul is to join together in a bond of friendship and to grow spiritually by offering person-toperson service to those who are needy and suffering.

We provide numerous services to help our neighbors in need. With the assistance of our parish members, volunteers, OLMC School, our Pastor, United Food Bank and many other benefactors. In this **fiscal year we have provided:**

- Food Boxes: 1806 food boxes delivered to hungry families.
- Rental Assistance: 107 families helped, an average of \$421 per family.
- Utility Assistance: 67 families helped, an average of \$180 per family.
- Furniture Vouchers: 28 families helped, an average of \$278 per family.
- Thanksgiving Dinner Boxes: 213 dinner boxes with turkey delivered to families.
- Adopt a Family Christmas: 41 families adopted, 88 adults & 126 children.
- Lenten Soup & Bread: Provided homemade soup and bread for the parishioners of Our Lady of Mount Carmel for faith and fellowship, and fun.

STATE OF THE SCHOOL ADDRESS

The theme of this school year is "Love one another as I have loved you." We are all made in the image and likeness of God. He is visible in the beautiful diversity in our students. They have different strengths and experiences and challenges. Some of these challenges may sometimes make it difficult for some to learn. Or to feel Christ's love. Or to love others. "Love one another" seems simple, but it asks us to love everyone. Always.

Christ gives this New Commandment in the Gospel of John. In the Great Commissioning in the Gospel of Matthew, Christ asks us to teach his commandment to everyone. In all 3 Synoptic Gospels he commands us to let the children come to Him.

At OLMC, this is our mission. It is different from the mission of public or charter schools that aim to educate and create good citizens. We must reach out to "all the world" and bring the children to Him so they can know His love and love others. LITTLE LAMBS PRESCHOOL

Kindergarten is a big step in a young child's life. Our preschool breaks it all down into smaller steps to help make the transition easier. Our daily curriculum covers faith formation, social and emotional skills, and academic foundation.

Our preschool is a Christ-centered, play-based, learning environment. We learn about the Holy Family, saints, feast days and prayers. On our Blessed Mother's feast days, the children and staff process around the elementary school campus with music and ribbons or flowers to honor her. In addition, the children participate in Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and we incorporate the Baltimore Catechism weekly.

We believe that in a caring and positive atmosphere a child will develop at his/her own pace and to his /her fullest potential. Part of our curriculum engages students in large or small group activities that facilitate respect, sharing, listening, cooperation and problem solving. Also, our preschoolers are paired with OLMC fourth graders as "buddies" and attend Mass with them on occasion. As our preschoolers enter kindergarten, they have friends in the upper classes as well as in their own grade.

Our curriculum covers ages 3s, young 4s, and pre-k. We provide age appropriate activities to develop kindergarten readiness. Activities include listening, language development, problem solving, group interaction, letter and sound recognition, counting and number recognition along with small and large motor activities, dramatic play, creative art, literature and music. In conclusion, our preschool is unique due to our faith formation, social and emotional positive environment and kindergarten readiness academic foundation. We are a ministry to families of young children and are dedicated to providing a quality Catholic preschool program to meet the needs of our community.




